Bob Reals Honored at Summer School

Following the NYSSSA Media Arts video and film intermission, NYSMATA Co - President, Mike Witsch presented Robert (Bob) Reals with the **NYSMATA Award for "Leadership in Media Arts Education"** noting Bob's many years of inspiration and distinguished service.

A long-time resident of Jamesville, N.Y., Bob was educated at SUNY, Albany and has been involved in the public schools all his adult life. He retired from his position as Supervisor of Arts and Humanities at the NYS Education Department twenty years ago.

Dedicated to Media Arts education in NYS, Bob was one of the organizers of the NYS Media Arts Teachers' Association and a long - time proponent of the NYSSSA in Media Arts. A dedicated adjudicator, he attended all the March media shows for years. He saw the early animations of Chris Wedge at the Syracuse technology conference in the 70's and lobbied to have Media Arts added to the summer schools of the arts.

Although retired, Bob remains an inspiration to teachers and students, through his encouraging words and very presence.

WALKER EVANS

On July15, in 1936, photographer **Walker Evans** began work on a project documenting the Great Depression. He was working for the photographic section of the Farm Security Administration, and he requested a leave of absence to work on a summer assignment for Fortune magazine. He was granted the leave on the condition that the photos he took would be considered government property. Evans, along with writer James Agee, went to Hale County, Alabama, to document the effects of the Great Depression on poor tenant farmers. For two months that summer, they traveled among the poor white cotton farmers, and got to know three families, whom Agee referred to as the Gudgers, the Ricketts, and the Woods. Their goal was a purely documentary one; they didn't want the images to be used for political or artistic purposes, but rather as an unflinching record.

Fortune wasn't happy with the outcome, declining to publish the piece, unless Agee rewrote it. He refused, and eventually Agee and Evans published it as a full-length book in 1941. It didn't sell well, and went out of print, but it was reissued in 1960, three years after Agee's death. The photos are now among the most famous images of the Great Depression.

Walker said: "Stare, pry, listen, eavesdrop. Die knowing something. You are not here long."
